Sarah N. Green passed away on August 10, 2011 in the place she loved best and is now at home with her God and savior Jesus Christ.

Sarah was born in Vernon, Texas on April 21, 1932. She lived there until her family moved to Dallas, where she graduated from North Dallas High School.

Sarah then attended University of Texas, where once a Longhorn football fan, always a Longhorn football fan – she even had someone call her with the scores for the UT/AM game when she was in the Caribbean on a sailboat trip. She did have to root for the Texas Aggies during one UT/AM game recently because she promised her internist from Texas A&M that she would.

After college, Sarah worked briefly for the Texas Employment Commission. Shortly after she started, she decided to give herself an early birthday present and quit to go to Lee Branch's accounting firm. She worked there until she started her own CPA business, Sarah N. Green and Associates, in 1982. In her practice as a CPA, Sarah didn't have clients – she had friends for whom she did their accounting work.

In the early 1960's, she joined Sweet Adelines and formed the Southern Accents quartet with her sister LoRee McGee, and friends Martha Hardin and Margaret Broadhead. In 1965, they won 1st prize in the Region 10 competition and went on to perform at Nationals that year.

Even though she quit Sweet Adelines after a couple of years, she always had a song in her heart and would entertain her niece and nephews on road trips with songs like "How much is that doggie in the window?," "Skyball Paint," and the old Sweet Adeline classic "Down By the Riverside."

Besides starting her own business and opening her home to friends and family in need, Sarah made two other important decisions that had a major impact in her life:

- If the late 1970's, she gave up smoking.
- Most importantly, in the early '80's, she accepted Christ as her Lord and savior.

From that time on, she attended churches in the different places that she lived.

An avid traveler, Sarah went through several passports. She liked nothing better than to sit and admire beautiful scenery in different parts of the world, such as the Antarctic, the wilds of Alaska, the Falkland Islands, the Grand Canyon, her Tetons, Europe, or New Zealand.

Her favorite places though were her lake house in east Texas and her summer home in Creede, Colorado, where she was active in bridge and had recently earned the ranking of Junior Master Bridge player.

She is survived by her nephews, Pat McGee and Mike McGee, and her niece and her husband, Terry and Mike Lambert, and her great nieces Katherine Frazier and Kelley Lambert, and numerous friends including Patti Mason, Marlene Goss, D'Arcy Fowler, and Johnye Williams and their families.
